Dear Friends in Christ,

In last month's edition of First Press I shared with you four ways to celebrate the holy day season without being totally exhausted by New Year's day:

- +set realistic expectations for the season;
- +make space for messy feelings like grief;
- +keep your self-care routine or begin a new one;
- +create your own traditions.

Here are a few more:

Give yourself permission to let it be a normal day. We've all fallen prey to what I like to call "Norman Rockwell Syndrome," which leads us to believe that unless the scene is picture-perfect, there is no real meaning or value. I personally love Norman Rockwell's art, but it is not entirely realistic for a majority of us. Even on our best day, someone in my family is bound to either have a stain on their shirt, a shoe lace untied, or lots of hair out of place (I bet you can guess who that is). NRS is particularly powerful during the holy day season. Whether on the front of Christmas cards or in store-front displays, we see nothing but smiles, perfectly wrapped presents, and, surprisingly, adults who look peaceful and calm as the kids tear through the presents and wreck the house in the meantime.

But the truth is, there is nothing that says Christmas Day or the holy day season has to be what retailers and artists make it out to be. The true meaning of Christmas - that God has become one of us - requires nothing more than a receptive and grateful heart. All the other 'stuff' is, well, just stuff. So if you find yourself struggling to figure out how to make Christmas 'special' this year, remember that giving thanks to God for the gift of Jesus Christ is more than an appropriate way to celebrate the Christmas miracle!

Don't feel guilty saying 'no.' I don't know a single person who has figured out how to do this well, myself included. But I do know what happens when we forget that 'no' is always an option that is available.

I had only been a pastor for about 5 months when it came time to preside for the first time over an Advent and Christmas celebration, and I wanted it to be just right. Even before the Thanksgiving turkey had fully cooled, I hit the ground running. If I wasn't decorating the house or baking several hours a night, I was visiting handfuls of church members and going to Christmas pageants and concerts for children in the church. There were wine and cheese parties on the weekends and fundraisers for every charity imaginable. Luckily, it was just me at that point in my life so I could be out of the house almost every night of the week. I had three good suits, and they were on rotation so that one or two would be at the cleaners while I wore the other one to the next event. And it was a spectacular season. That is, until I woke up Christmas Eve morning with a terrible fever and cough and could barely get out of bed.

Here it was Christmas Eve, the night when we celebrate the true meaning of Christmas, and I was sick as can be. I nursed myself all day long on mint tea and Advil, and I was in pretty good shape for the first worship service of the evening. But by the end of the third service, I could barely get one foot in front of another. I had spent all season going and doing and it wore me right down to the bone. I had not set proper boundaries and thought, because of some NRS, that everything had to be just right or nothing would be right at all. And when it came time to worship the Newborn King, I almost fell asleep singing "Silent Night."

Here is something else that is true: Christ is born among us. And he is born among us despite, and maybe in spite of, all the ways we run ourselves ragged at the holy days. Make a commitment to get to Christmas this year healthy and filled with joy for the great gift that is coming, even if that means saying 'no' to a few things along the way.

Finally, remember how much you are loved by God and by this community. Love is really at the heart of the Christmas story. Love that was so strong that it could only be expressed in the living and breathing One who took our form and walked among us.

It defies expectation. It resists categories and definition. There is no scientific way to explain it. But God became one of us in a manger in Bethlehem and our lives and the world have never been the same. By faith we see that Christ was not only on this earth several thousands of years ago, but is born and reborn each day when the great love of God is shared among his people. There is no greater command for us as his followers than to live in love. Each day we share that love with someone, Christ is born. Every day we chose to honor the dignity of all living things, Christ is born. When we resist the powers of evil that would have us constantly at each other's throats, Christ is born. With our prayers and our worship, we acknowledge the Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace, of whose rule over all things will never come to an end.

Come, let us adore him!





A Special Message from Pastor Andrew and Family




FPC Community and Friends,

It's my honor and joy to share with you the celebration of Eleanor's time with all the families in her life. I knew her as part of her church family and also her music family, as we first met in church choir and then sang for many years with the Northern Choral Society. Her stories were great, and her voice was wonderful – not a solo, but a choir voice, adding her alto depth to the beauty of sound. She talked often of the big trip she made with that group to England in the late 80's – before my time.

Her voice sang the songs of her love and pride for her family, as I'd drive her home following rehearsals and we'd converse in the car, sharing joys.

Her voice also rang through her writings! She was a long time member of a Jefferson County Writers group, and was well regarded for the twinkle in her eyes and the love in her heart that came through her poems. While her singing voice is not here, nor her conversations, her writings are still around in places. She wrote a poem following the tragedy of 9/11 that our organist Carl Bingle put to music. We have sung it at poignant moments of world events as a reminder of the greater things that are present. Today I offer you other words left us with other feelings. Here are 3; please hear the smile in Ellie's voice..

From Eleanor, August 1, 1993:
